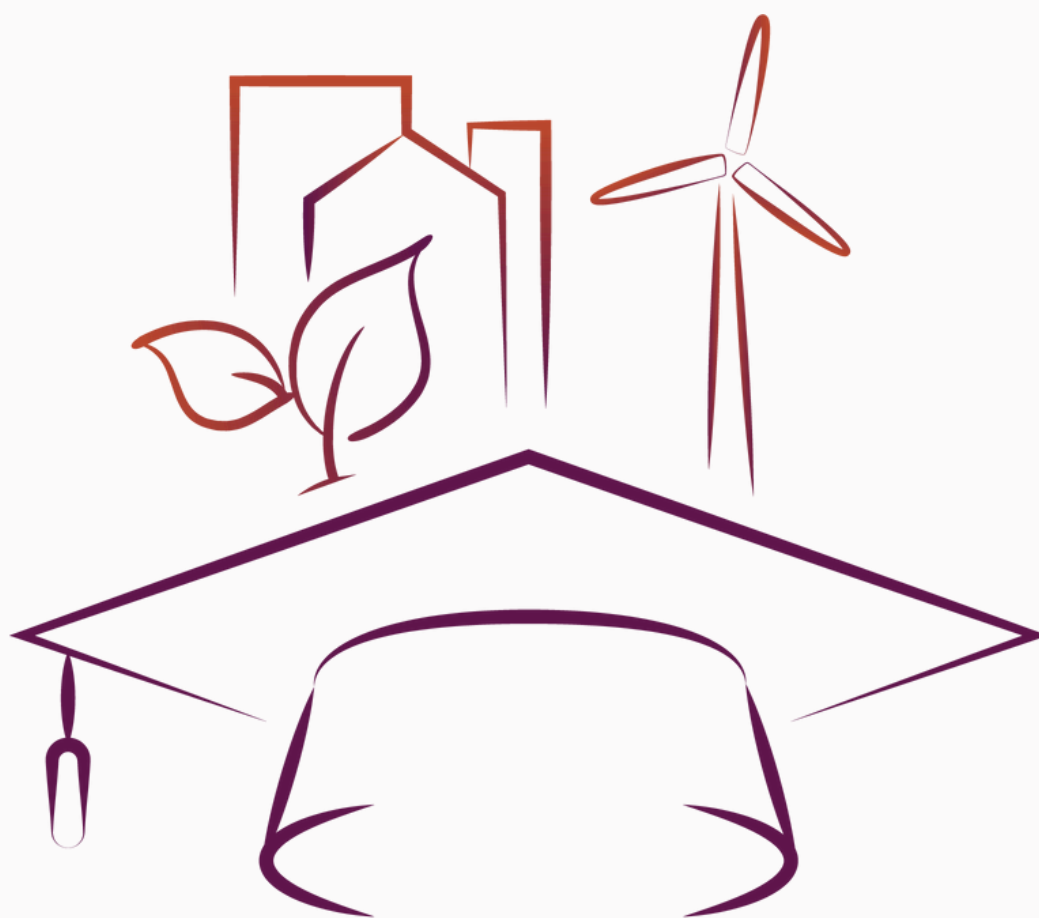

**NWEA MAP TESTING

Professional Development and Collaboration

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Rubric for NWEA MAP Testing Implementation

1. Data Interpretation and Use

- **Not Implemented:** MAP data is not regularly reviewed or used to inform instruction.
- **Developing:** MAP data is occasionally reviewed, with minimal application to instructional practices.
- **Proficient:** MAP data is regularly reviewed and used to make informed instructional decisions and set student goals.
- **Exemplary:** MAP data is thoroughly analyzed and used to drive differentiated instruction, goal setting, and student engagement in learning.

2. Instructional Alignment

- **Not Implemented:** Instructional practices are not aligned with MAP assessment data.
- **Developing:** Some efforts are made to align instruction with MAP data, but these are inconsistent.

Scoring Guide for NWEA MAP Testing Implementation Rubric

Categories:

- Data Interpretation and Use
- Instructional Alignment
- Monitoring Student Progress
- Professional Development
- Stakeholder Engagement

Levels of Achievement:

- 0 - Not Implemented: The criterion is not observed or present in any form.
- 1 - Developing: Initial efforts towards implementation are visible, but practices are inconsistent and not fully developed.
- 2 - Proficient: The criterion is met with consistent and effective practices that align with standard expectations.
- 3 - Exemplary: The criterion is met with highly effective, innovative practices that exceed standard expectations and demonstrate a model for others to follow.

Scoring:

- Total Possible Score: 15 points per category, for a combined total of 75 points across all categories.
- Interpretation of Scores:
 - 0-15 Points: Implementation is in the early or planning stages, with significant development needed.
 - 16-30 Points: Some elements of MAP Testing implementation are in place, with room for improvement and development.
 - 31-45 Points: Proficient implementation with consistent use of MAP data to inform instruction and support student learning.
 - 46-60 Points: Strong implementation with advanced use of MAP data, demonstrating effective instructional alignment and engagement practices.
 - 61-75 Points: Exemplary implementation with comprehensive integration of MAP Testing data into all aspects of instruction, professional development, and stakeholder engagement.

Usage:

This scoring guide should be used to periodically assess and reflect on the implementation of NWEA MAP Testing within an educational setting. It can help identify areas of strength and areas needing improvement, guiding professional development and strategic planning efforts to enhance instructional practices and student outcomes.
